Description of the track

In the past years, supply chains have been subject to a variety of disruptions (starting from trade policy shocks, the COVID-19 crisis, semiconductor shortages or more recently the Ukraine-Russia war). Firms and policymakers are reconsidering their views on the ever-growing fragmentation of production processes and have become more aware about the vulnerabilities embedded in global value chains. Rethinking the efficiency-resilience trade-off in supply chains as well as identifying sources of dependence on strategic inputs have become crucial to firm success on international markets and a matter of concern for many governments' industrial policy

During this workshop, we welcome any paper addressing these issues, and more in particular studies interested in the following topics:

- Measuring supply chains and their resilience
- Conceptualizing supply chains
- Managing supply chains and their resilience: business and policy tools
- Firm, sector and country level perspectives on supply chains
- Policy implications of disruptive shocks: how to build resilience in regional and national supply chains
- Firm responses and practical implications of such shocks
