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# 1. About CGD

# **Description**

The Centre for Gender and Diversity (CGD) is a research platform at Maastricht University's Faculty of Arts and Social Sciences. The CGD's mission is to connect researchers in the fields of gender and diversity studies, to facilitate networking with societal partners, and to enhance public-facing scholarship.

Our members broadly focus on studying mechanisms of inclusion and exclusion from an intersectional perspective. The research we conduct concerns the making of cultural and social differences in cases of embodied experience, art, language, law, institutions, science and technology, and is grounded in feminist and intersectional approaches to critical analysis. We aim to use our research as a vector of change - to not only describe and explain social issues but to engage stakeholders and intervene for the sake of social justice.

### **History and Ambition**

Founded in September 1998, the CGD has a nearly 25-year tradition of creating synergy between the Three As: Academic Research, Art, and Activism. Our research projects are interdisciplinary, embedded, and conduct knowledge creation with the participation of partners. CGD scholarship charts the symbolic systems of the arts, cultural production, and language use. It maps and transforms the interactions of schemata for masculinity and femininity with social difference categories of race, class, age, ability, sexuality, religion, residency status, as well as multitude emerging factors that influence personhood/subject positions. The overarching CGD intellectual mission is the historical and contemporary study of the complex interactions between these intersecting vectors of power differentials, in the tradition of feminist theories and methods of intersectionality.

In our research on a wide variety of minoritized subjects we do not lose sight of how intersectional approaches have been developed primarily by Black and of color feminists to account for multiple forms of oppression. In an interdisciplinary fashion, we seek to contribute to the development of intersectionality by combining empirical and sociological data and philosophies of embodiment with a humanities approach to the study of the arts: including literature, life-writing, performance, visual culture, digital culture, heritage, and cultural institutions.

Our theoretical ambition is to reassess the humanism at the core of intersectionality. We do so through the key question we ask of these art forms interfacing with society: what composes the Human? Here, there, now, and then? This brings our scholarship to debates in science (technicity), ethics of medicine and care (personhood), to the exigencies of enslavement (coloniality), and to the realm of nature (animality). Hence, we also contribute to Critical Life Studies that grapples with the multiple 'turns' (e.g. new materialism, Anthropocene, affective) and multiplying field 'studies' (trans, queer, critical race, postcolonial, animal, age, disability) in critical theory that interrogate the ontological hold of the Human in the face of global crises of climate and social justice.

# 2. Organization

The CGD is exclusively funded by the Faculty Board of FASoS, and reports to them annually. Given this organizational structure, the CGD's affiliate members that are supported by its funds are FASoS scientific personnel. Affiliate members also include PhD candidates registered at the Graduate School and UCM staff members. Since 1 September 2022, the CGD has welcomed as participating members Teaching Fellows who are developing a PhD proposal or otherwise engaged in research. (Funding is available to support research activities to any staff member at UM so long as they partner up with one or more CGD members.) Members actively collaborate with colleagues from across the university, with regional institutions and organizations such as the Jan van Eyck, national partners including the Research School for Gender Studies, and form international alliances with other centres and networks.

The director is Dr. Eliza Steinbock, who oversees the daily management of the budget, event organization, networking for the centre, internal and external communications.

# 3. Overview and Reflection on the year 2022 - 2023

## **Changes**

In the period of 2017-2021 the CGD consisted of 5-8 affiliated staff members who largely focused on developing international networks through funded projects: 1) Research Network Gender in Antisemitism, Orientalism and Occidentalism, 2) European Network in Aging Studies, 3) Platform for a Cultural History of Children's Media, 4) Black and PoC Academic Network. As noted by the previous director Lies Wesseling in her last report, two central members who represented expertise in religion studies left during 2021 due to retirement and a new position. At the same time, in the last years, the faculty has hired many postdocs, assistant, associate and full professors as well as teaching fellows who have research expertise, enthusiasm, and great interest in the fields of gender and diversity studies.

My vision as the new leadership of the CGD has been to make this platform an inclusive space for pursuing feminist research, broadly understood. In this big tent, I sought to welcome and embrace FASoS colleagues (new and old) from outside of the Department of Literature and Art, namely those in our faculty whose primary areas of study were not arts and culture. When I was hired as Associate Professor in Gender and Diversity Studies, I was given a year to settle into the faculty before becoming the director. In this year I took time to get to know the various profiles and interests of colleagues from the Departments of Philosophy, Society Studies, History, and Political Science. I invited those working on any issue related to gender, sexuality, race/ethnicity, class, religion, nationality/residency status, or forms of discrimination to come join or take part in CGD events. When I took the helm on September 2022, my first act as director was to have a welcome (back) party for the membership, which was attended by 30 persons. Since then the CGD has grown to become 40 FASoS members strong and our members come from all departments and from across all of the research programs: a more matrixial grouping than ever before. They are now represented on our refreshed webpage. The membership brings in new areas of expertise: for example we have scholars of economics and ethics, migration and diaspora, environment and climate politics, transgender and disability studies, philosophies of race, heritage/memory studies, and social movements. Outside of FASoS and at the UM we also have many more interested colleagues who participate in our events or collaborate with our members to make events happen, specifically from UCM, FHML, and the Diversity and Inclusivity Office.

Since September 2022, I made three major adjustments to the organization mission of the CGD that have been communicated to the membership at large in the welcome back meeting, and through 1-to-1 conversations where appropriate:

- 1. We will retain a focus on the arts, but not exclusively. This allows us to open up to new members and to become more representative of FASoS as a whole. The CGD therefore comes into line with the research organization of the Social Sciences and Humanities as a set of connected disciplines, which is the structure for example at the Lorenz Centre, NWO, and ERC.
- 2. In recognition that the CGD is a research platform and that staffing, delivery, and evaluation of all educational programs are organized through capgroups, the requisite programs, EPCs and the Board of Examiners, the CGD will cease to oversee and archive the courses that it

has developed and traditionally coordinated. These include 11 UCM courses, 6 BA AC courses, the new MA AC specialization CLA, and the ResMA CAST 1D course as well as the minor Gender and Diversity Studies (which currently lacks an EPC). That all these CGD-developed and taught courses remain popular and by now have become fully integrated in larger programs is something to be celebrated. Many CGD members are also involved in the working group of Diversifying the BA AC curriculum and the COOPRADIV group, which meet the immediate needs to exchange and act on educational topics of concern.

3. To align with the Faculty's strategic plan and the adoption of Recognition and Rewards, the CGD will prioritize its efforts in initiating and facilitating collaboration through research and action networks, and together with societal partners. I set out with the aim to sponsor a minimum of three research and valorization events a year to increase success rates of funding applications and generative collaborations. We met this goal in our first academic year (2022-2023).

#### **Achievements**

I have focused on creating a professional infrastructure for the CGD to be sure that we are able to function as a larger-scale group in an open and transparent manner.

- 1. We now have a "cgd-fasos" email that is a shared inbox with a student assistant.
- 2. The student assistant is given set weekly tasks by the director, and in addition room to develop a project: Rahel focused on updating the webpage and Emma is creating our social media presence on Instagram and LinkedIn.
- 3. It was necessary to update the CGD webpage as it contained outdated information from 6 years ago and many deadlinks. We worked with Claire Bollen to design static pages and dynamic information that is viewable from the homepage. Together with input from members, the webpage was completely renewed by the end of January 2023.

- 4. Due to the comments I heard about 'meeting fatigue,' I decided to suspend the regular sessions that largely followed the capgroup and research programme's frequency. In contrast to year's past with set meetings every 6-8 weeks, I decided to develop an events-based calendar proposed and co-organized by members that would form our annual program. Each event was supported with money available from the Centre for Gender and Diversity Event Fund (CGD-EF). I designed a simple 1-page application based on the RSF form, easy to download from the webpage, and which was passed out in hardcopy at the Welcome Back meeting. The CGD-EF encouraged joint applications, was accepted on a rolling basis,

- and would provide for costs related to the event up to 2k. No direct results were required, but it was encouraged as a means to generate output such as publications, grant applications, or the formalizing of a network or societal partnership. We also encouraged reading groups, writing accountability groups, PhD clubs, and other informal gatherings, but the ones that existed decided to continue without requesting additional monetary support that would provide for coffee and cookies, etc. The director and student assistant assist in developing the event idea and possible collaborations, determining the best format for it, and taking care of reserving the room, catering, speaker fee, and accommodation.
- 5. Communication has been streamlined through our group on UMployee (negating the need for a newsletter at the moment). In the near future we will create Outlook email groups for internal members and guests. We maintain the CGD Web presence on the UM site, have opened an Instagram account with short interviews of members and are planning a Linked-In account. To establish a presence in the building of GG80-82 on the second-floor hallway, I created the Centre's "G&D Article Tree" pin board of articles we want to share and the Centre's "G&D Book Harvest" wall baskets for copies of our dissertations, monographs, edited volumes, and special issues. We also have a direct line of communication with the Diversity and Inclusivity Office through the Advisory Council, which I am a member of and which is chaired by the University President Prof. dr. Rianne Letschert.
- 6. The CGD is keen to have regular visiting fellows from abroad to develop facets of our on-going research and to increase our international standing. This past year we have been joined by Maria Vtorushina, the First Soteria Fellow, who is researching Ukrainian queer art history and working as a curator. We are preparing an application to have two visiting fellows from the University of Toronto join us next year.
- 7. As announced in our welcome back meeting (Sep 2022), this coming year I made it a priority to develop our new community and honor the 25-year history of CGD members through organizing an anniversary symposium on "Intergenerational Feminisms" (Sep 2023). In two open meetings, we agreed on a program that includes the different focal points of research and a creative memory activity using CGD archival materials.

- the university can be set up, and to explore how "embedded research" has particular advantages and potential drawbacks.
- 6. 2 Nov 2022: Karlien Strijbosch, Workshop "Researching Gender, Sexuality and Health beyond European contexts" for 4 early career scholars at UM and one postdoc in Spain. And Colloquium Lecture "The politics of care: Making and unmaking families in South Africa" from the medical anthropologist Prof. Nolwazi Mkhwanazi (Pretoria), co-organized with the research program Globalisation, Transnationalism and Development attended by 25 people (CGD and GTD members, and the students from master of Globalisation and Development). Appealing to both groups, Mkhwanazi researches on ageing and care in Southern Africa; her main focus has been on young people, reproduction, sexuality and gender.

#### Interfaculty collaboration:

- As Director of the CGD, Eliza Steinbock was invited to give a Welcome address to the 12th Annual Maastricht Symposium for Global Health at FHML with the theme of "The politics of knowledge production in Global Health: Towards the undoing of coloniality and the revitalizing of lived experiences" (20 Oct. 2022). I spoke about the importance of decolonization practices for the wider university community and a brief history of UM's own regional hand in benefiting from colonialism. Attended by around 100 students and staff.
- 2. The CGD was an official sponsor of a reading group organized around Sara Ahmed's book *Complaint!* (2021). This was a collaboration with the D&I Office, MYA, and JvE that aimed to bring together a range of people (students-staff) from different institutional settings to discuss complaint processes, structural discrimination, and solidarity. At the first meeting on 14 Dec 2022, as the CGD director, Eliza Steinbock gave a short introduction to the work of feminist scholar and philosopher Sara Ahmed. Our 1 March and 10 May meetings are for discussing the chapters, our experiences that are (dis)similar, and what as a group we might want to do in terms of organizing a complaint collective.

3. As Director of the CGD, Eliza Steinbock gave input into the planning and framing of the event organized by members of the UM Iranian community together with D&I Office, "Perspectives on Women | Life | Freedom," which took place on 14 Feb 2023.

#### National collaboration:

We participate in the board and the curriculum committee of the Netherlands Research School for Gender Studies (NOG), which meets regularly (2-3 times) throughout the year. Since 1 September Eliza Steinbock has replaced Lies Wesseling on the board, and Faisal Hamadah replaced Louis van den Hengel on the curriculum committee.

- 4. May 2022: Eliza Steinbock taught a half-day for the NOG PhD Council Workshop "Get Published! An afternoon on the intricacies of publishing through the eyes of Gender Studies publishers" with Suzanne Clisby (Coventry University, UK) at Utrecht University.
- 5. 3 June 2022: We hosted the Annual Research Day of the Netherlands School for Gender Studies, which was co-organized by Lies Wesseling and Eliza Steinbock, online. The program included a keynote from SA Smythe (University of Toronto) on *Black Life, Trans Study, and the Geographies of Institutionalization*; a roundtable featuring current research projects: E. Costa (University of Groningen) *Work and digital inequalities in southern Europe*; A. Halsema (Leiden University/Vrije Universiteit Amsterdam) *Hermeneutics of the body. Interpreting trans and cis gender*; D. Semerene (University of Amsterdam) *This Trans Discourse Which Is Not One: Notes from a Psychoanalytic Encounter with Trans-ness*; and E. Hayward (Utrecht University) *After Medusa*. We closed with a PhD panel on "How to Design and Start up your PhD Project: Challenges and Strategies" with contributions from Vasiliki Belia (Maastricht University), Aldo Kempen (Open University), Nik Linders (Radboud University), and Sarah Trottier (Utrecht University)
- 6. 8 Feb 2023: Louis van den Hengel organized the "Curating Social Change: Research, Creation, Action" Symposium for the Inclusive Societies strand of AMC, attended by about 65 people. This symposium explored how themes and processes of social change relate to the theory and praxis of artistic creation, curatorial practice, and other critical acts of worldmaking. Speakers: Luca Soudant (OU) and Bruno Alves de Almeida (Jan van Eyck Academie).

# 5. Research OutputPlans for 2023 - 2024

In the coming years 2023-2024, the CGD will expand on making funding streams available to its affiliate members. We will supplement the CGD-EF for research and valorization events with a CGD-PF for book publications that are demonstrably contributing to Open Science, Open Access and/or Public Humanities. The aim is to bolster members' research activities and output. To encourage member participation and bring more (inter)national awareness and exchange, we will also launch a funded lecture series called VECTORS for Change. During the September 2023 welcome back meeting, all CGD members will be invited to make a short presentation about a possible speaker and we will take a poll for who to invite.

We will prioritize developing international alliances with other research centres dedicated to Gender and Diversity, and in particular joining RINGS the International Research Association of Institutes of Advanced Gender Studies that connects over 50 centres.


