

The international population of Maastricht is growing rapidly. Despite the fact that Dutch is the main language in this city, English is also widely spoken. Due to the proximity to Belgium and Germany, you will also find a lot of French and German speakers in Maastricht.

Maastricht is characterised by its, historic buildings and trendy designer stores, adventurous caves, menus full of taste sensations and terraces full of conviviality, vibrant festivals and its wide squares. In short, the perfect city to have the best time while studying!

Maastricht is centrally located in the heart of Europe, bordering Belgium and Germany, which means that Brussels is an hour-and-a-half away, Amsterdam two, Paris and Frankfurt three, and London four-and-a-half hours.

Any location you might want to visit can be reached within a few hours. The plane, train, bus will take you pretty much anywhere you want to go. The high-speed train services (InterCityExpress and Eurostar), are the best choices for travelling throughout Europe. The relatively short distances between cities and the comfort of travelling (sightseeing on the go, no check-in, arrive in city center) makes it the quickest way of getting around. If you prefer to fly anyway? There are eight airports within an hour's travel.

Housing

UM Guesthouse

Most exchange students end up staying at the UM Guesthouse, which is located in the vicinity of the university buildings. Unfortunately, we cannot guarantee that all students who apply will get a room at the UM Guesthouse. Applications for the guesthouse are processed on a first-come first-served basis. Reserving a room at the UM Guesthouse is only possible via their online reservation system (www.maastrichthousing.com).

How to find housing on your own?

Of course, you are not obliged to rent a room in the UM Guesthouse, even though it is the easiest option. You can also find a room on the private market. It is not always easy to find a room in Maastricht, so it is best to start as soon as possible. Maastricht Housing acts as intermediary for the local/private housing corporations in the so called "social" rent sector. The MyHousing portal will notify you whenever new offers that meet your needs become available.

Costs of living

Students looking to move to the Netherlands are drawn to Maastricht because the cost of living is lower than in other Dutch student cities such as Amsterdam or Rotterdam. Living in Maastricht is a good decision for those looking to stretch their budget.

For example, living in Maastricht will save you money on the biggest monthly expense: rent. On average rent in Maastricht is about 34% lower compared to student housing in Amsterdam.

The daily expenses include accommodation, insurance, books and study materials, groceries, transportation, clothing and personal care, leisure, and other expenses. Experience has shown that students living and studying in the Netherlands spend approximately € 1.850 a month. Visa

Nationals of the following countries do not need a long-stay visa to study in the Netherlands: Members of the EU, EEA, Switzerland, UK, Australia, Canada, Japan, Monaco, New Zealand, South Korea, USA and Vatican City State. A longstay visa is necessary for nationals of all other countries (if you are a Chinese national, make sure you carefully read the information about the Nuffic certificate.) For a stay of more than three (3) months, all non-EU nationals need a residence permit. Please check the webpage of our Visa Office for more information.

If applicable, Maastricht University's Visa Office will contact you regarding the visa and/or residence permit application via your Maastricht University email account.

→ Important note

It is compulsory for all international students, studying at a Dutch university to have an adequate health and liability insurance during their stay.

Teaching Method

Problem-Based Learning (PBL) offers you a different, more active, way of learning from traditional university education.

Students do not spend hours listening to lectures - although there are some - instead, per course, they attend two-hour tutorial group meetings twice a week.

These meetings form the core part of the study programme and are the driving force for learning. Within the tutorial groups, problems are presented and researched as cases.

A tutorial group is composed of 12 students plus a tutor: a staff member who guides the group process but who does not automatically give answers to the problems. It is up to the students to discover where their knowledge falls short and to fill in the gaps. To do so, you will have to spend

a lot of time between tutorial meetings to read articles and books, and to do research in the university library.

The international classroom- in other words, working in small tutorial groups with people from different cultural backgrounds- adds to the benefits of the PBL system. By approaching problems from a variety of perspectives, students become acquainted with different ways of seeing things and that enhances the quality of discussions. In this way, the international classroom prepares you for the rapidly globalising labour market.

Important note

PBL requires adequate preparation and participation of all students in a tutorial in order to be succesful. Therefore the majority of UCM courses require an attendance of at least 85%.

Academic calendar

The academic calendar is divided into two semesters, a fall and a spring semester. Each semester is further divided into three different course periods:

- Fall semester: course periods 1, 2 and 3
- Spring semester: course periods 4, 5 and 6

Course periods 1, 2, 4 and 5 consists of seven education weeks including one exam week. Course periods 3 and 6 consist of three weeks of so-called skills training; these are not compulsory for exchange students.

Study load and skills training

Course database

In the online course catalogue, you will find all information about our bachelor's courses at Univerisity College Maastricht. This includes information about when a course is offered, prerequisites, number of ECTS credits, learning outcomes and competences and literature. (www.ucm.nl/exchange)

Skills training

Focusing on the mere acquisition of knowledge is not sufficient if you are a student at University College Maastricht. You have to be able to work in all kinds of organizations, which implies that you need to develop social and communication skills. And don't forget research and presentation skills or argumentation and international negotiation, these are also essential in today's employment market.

Study load

As an exchange student at UCM, you will register for at least 20 ECTS and maximum 30 ECTS per semester. A full time student will enroll in 2 courses (each 5 ECTS) and 1 skill (2.5 ECTS) in both periods 1 and 2 for fall and period 4 and 5 in spring. During periods 3 and 6, our project periods, students enroll in 1 project.

Exchange students will discuss their study plan with their home university's Academic Advisor and will enroll accordingly.

Important note

Most courses (except for the skills trainings) are worth 5 ECTS credits. One ECTS credit equals 28 hours of study, which means that one regular course equals 140 hours of study, 36 of which should be considered contact hours.

Application journey

Steps to entry

Before you apply

1. Eligibility

As a bachelor student you need to have completed at least two semesters at your home university before starting your exchange. At UCM we ask that exchange students meet a min GPA of 3.0 out of 4.0.

2. English language requirement

All courses are taught in English. To successfully complete your courses, we request proof of an advanced level of English of all students, comparable to a Cambridge B2 level. If you are a native speaker or your home university teaches solely in English, you do not need to provide proof.

Our Problem-Based Learning (PBL) approach requires you to actively engage with the subject matter in your tutorials. To be able to participate in UM's teaching method it is essential to master an advanced level of both written and spoken English.

How to apply

3. Nomination by home university

As an exchange student, your home university must officially nominate you. After your home university submitted your nomination, you will be informed about the online registration and application procedure via our "First Mail".

4. Online registration and application

After you have finished your online application, we will process this as soon as possible. We will send your acceptance letter by email about three months before the start of your study in Maastricht. If applicable, Maastricht University's Visa Office will contact you regarding the visa and/or residence permit application.

The Student Portal


Electronic learning environment

The Student Portal application provides information on courses and serves as a portal for all student information. Throughout the programme you can access your own course materials, for example readers, PowerPoint presentations, assignments, exams and various means of communication such as announcements, group discussions, timetables, etc. You will be introduced to the Student Portal at the start of your programme.

What can you find on the Student Portal:

- Information on the courses you attend (including a database with course descriptions);
- Manuals and forms;
- Deadlines for reregistration and withdrawal;
- Education and examination schedules;
- · Examination results:

- Announcements from your tutor or course coordinator;
- A portal to submit your assignments;
- All materials to take the course (for example literature, cases, data, sheets and old exams);
- The entrance to a community that is especially designed for your tutorial group, where you can work individually on tasks and learning goals, and together with your fellow students on group assignments;
- Your UM e-mail account:
- Entrance to the UCM Student Intranet, on which you can find information about Student Counselling, the International Relations Office, the Student Council, the Code of Conduct, regulations, rights and duties etc.
