MCEL scholars engage with society

In the past few months, various MCEL scholars have been actively engaging with society on a number of topics. We would like to draw your attention to a number of activities. More information is available through our Facebook page.

Elise Muir and Vigjilenca Abazi appeared before the European Parliament in hearings. Elise was heard on 'Taking Citizens' concerns seriously: broadening the scope of the EU Charter on Fundamental Rights (Article 51)?'. Vigjilenca presented the draft directive for whistle-blower protection across EU. Marcus Meyer was interviewed on his empirical work on Dutch central works councils by 'Praktijkblad Ondernemingsraad'. Francesca Galli commented on the terrorist attacks in Brussels before Italian television. Sarah Schoenmaekers spoke before the American Bar Association about fraud and corruption in European public procurement and the ways to tackle anti-competitive behaviour. Ellen Vos wrote a blog on EU agencies and started, together with colleagues from legal, political and social disciplines, a dialogue with various practitioners on challenges posed by the ongoing agencification.

Lisa Waddington actively contributed to the debate on the consequences of the British referendum in June. Faced with the sad results of that referendum, MCEL scholars will continue to discuss about the consequences of a Brexit and will also engage on an academic level with the future design of the EU.

The second half of this academic year has been marked by two inaugural lectures. Prof. O. Jansen gave a presentation on 'Administrative Law and its Territory' and Prof. J. Vidmar devoted his speech to 'Wrongfulness, Responsibility and Defences in International Law'.

Several events were organised on the Campus of Maastricht University in Brussels. A workshop on 'The Law and Politics of EU Confidential Negotiations' was co-organised by V. Abazi and Dr. J. Adriaensen (12th February). An event on 'The Cultural Open Method of Coordination: A New Boost for European





Cultural Policies?' was hosted by E. Psychogiopoulou and B. de Witte (20th June). Our MCEL Research Seminars continue to be lively. A. Meuwese, from Tilburg University, invited us to reflect on 'Impact Assessment as an (Inter-)Institutional Magic Wand?'. The Head of Data Protection at Eurojust, D. A. Bas, presented on 'Processing and Protection of Personal Data at Eurojust after Lisbon: Is the New Legal Framework for Better or for Worse?'. MCEL members N. Gundt and A.P. van der Mei introduced recent rulings of the CJEU on social tourism, delegation of rule-making powers to the Commission and the European Arrest Warrant regime. S. Garben, from the College of Europe, triggered interesting debates on 'Balancing 'the Market' and 'the Social' in the EU'. Finally, E. Psychogiopoulou reported on her research on the Cultural Open Method of Coordination and opened a discussion with K. Mattocks, from the City University London, whose own research on the governance of Culture was also introduced.

MCEL researchers have gathered in the framework of the MCEL PhD Forum. M. Bonelli gave a presentation entitled 'A Rule of Law Crisis in Poland? Developments and EU's Reaction'. A. Broderick explained the findings of her PhD entitled 'The Long and Winding Road to Equality and Inclusion for Persons with Disabilities: the UNCRPD'. J. Hillebrand-Pohl discussed 'Financial Transaction Taxes and the Right of Free Transfer and Convertibility under International Investment Law'. S. Nobrega introduced her PhD Chapter on 'Access to Information and Public Participation at the EU level: the Biofuels Case'. We also had a final session to discuss recent European case law.

Finally, students in EU law, supported by MCEL members, have performed greatly in the past months. The Maastricht team (K.Wende, E. Meurgey, L. Fleuret, J. Timmermans) coached by P. Melin was semi-finalist at the All-European Finals of the European Law Moot Court. C. Campo (supervised by E. Muir) was given the award for the best bachelor thesis of the European Law School of 2015. Maastricht University also hosted one of the regional finals of the European Law Moot Court.

Focus

New book: 'Climate Change Law'

Marjan Peeters, MCEL scholar, has co-edited together with Daniel A. Farber (Berkeley) a new book. This book brings together over 70 legal scholars from across the world for a comprehensive examination in 54 chapters of the emerging field of climate change law.

Rather than delving into the details of the law, the emphasis is on disclosing scholarship on core topics such as human rights and climate change, the challenge of a coherent international treaty approach, the role of principles such

as the precautionary principle, the choice and design of regulatory instruments for reducing greenhouse gas emissions, legal issues of geo-engineering, and the potential role of international and national courts in relation to climate change. Specific chapters discuss the EU emissions trading scheme and EU renewable energy law.



As it has evolved, climate law is a combination of international frameworks such as the Paris Agreement from 12 December 2015 and bottom-up efforts by national and sub-national governments. This legal field is substantively linked to other areas of law such as energy regulation, water law, and land use law, while raising new issues for various disciplines of law, including public international law, constitutional law and administrative law. The concluding chapter brings together the insights and discusses the polycentric development of a 'global climate law'.

Climate Change Law is the first issue of the Elgar Encyclopedia of Environmental Law under the general direction of Michael Faure (also from our University). More at http://www.e-elgar.com/shop/climate-change-law.
