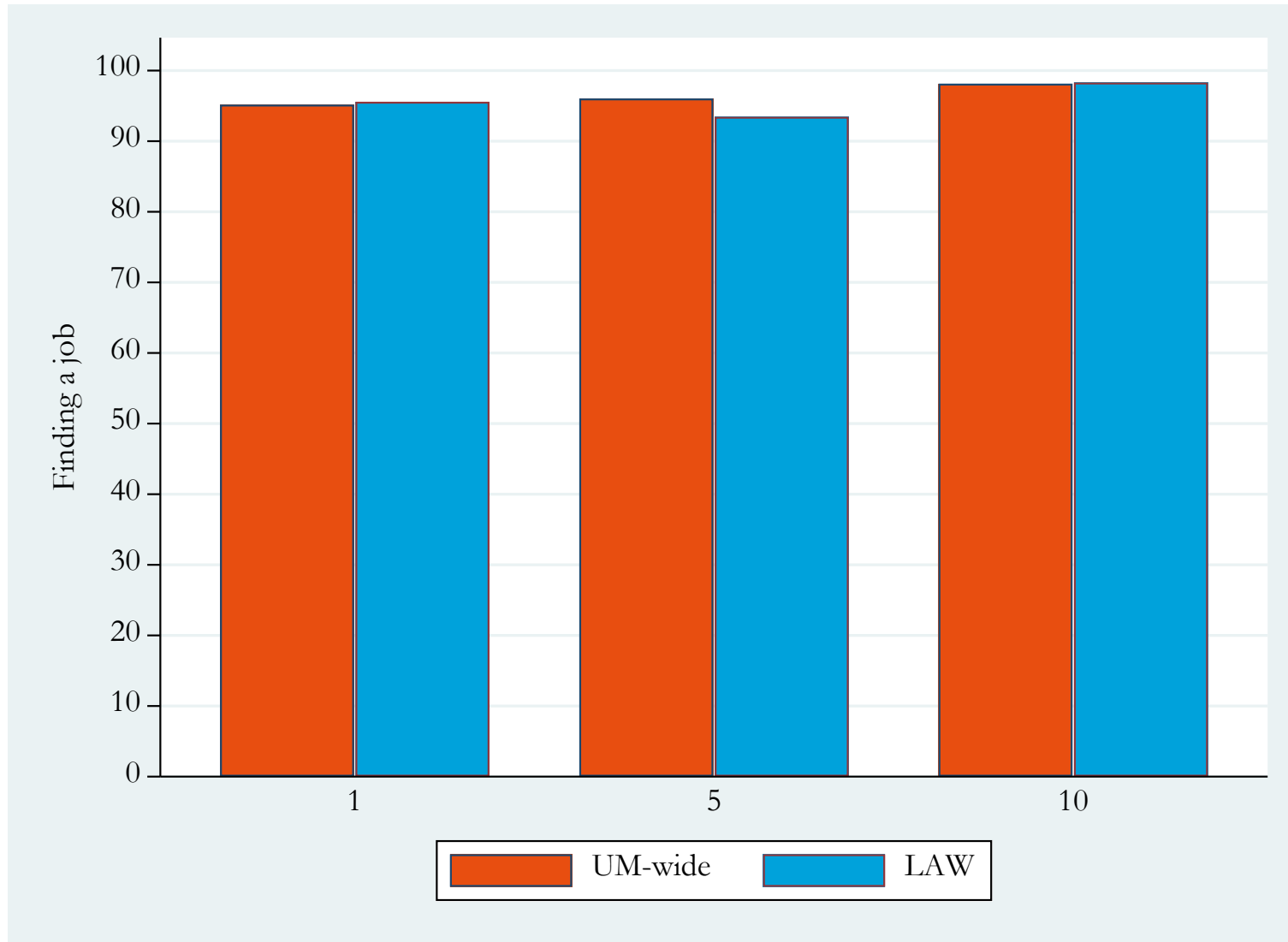

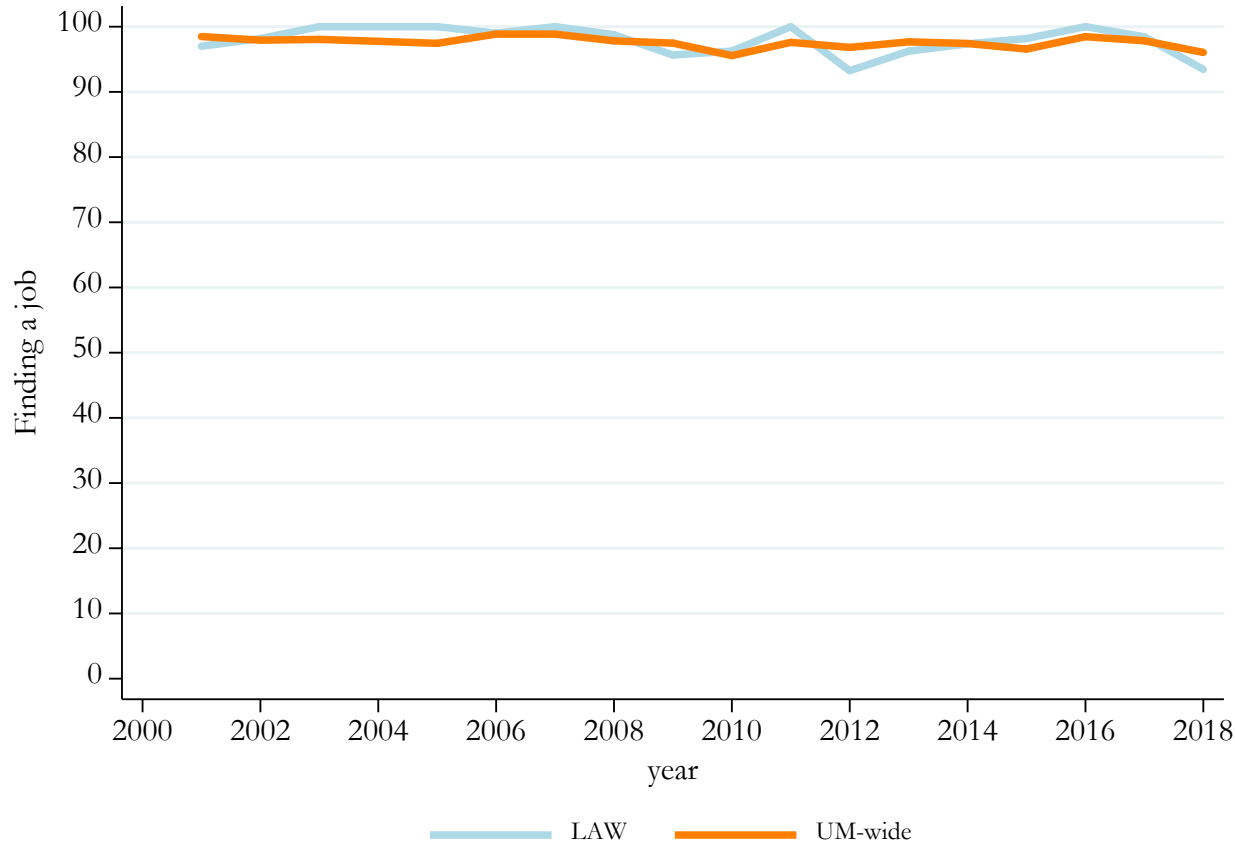

Trend in employment 5 years after graduation



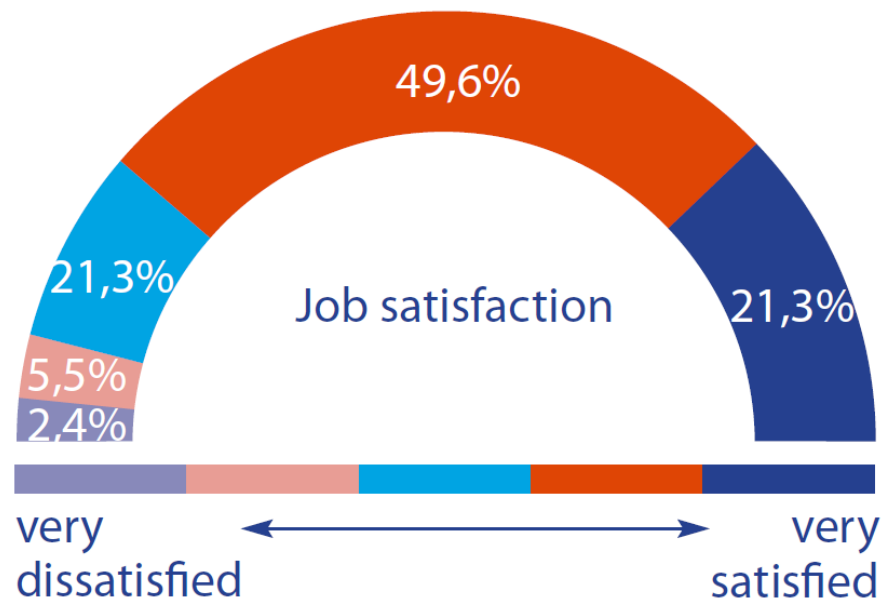
How do LAW graduates rank career aspects?



Rank 1. Job content

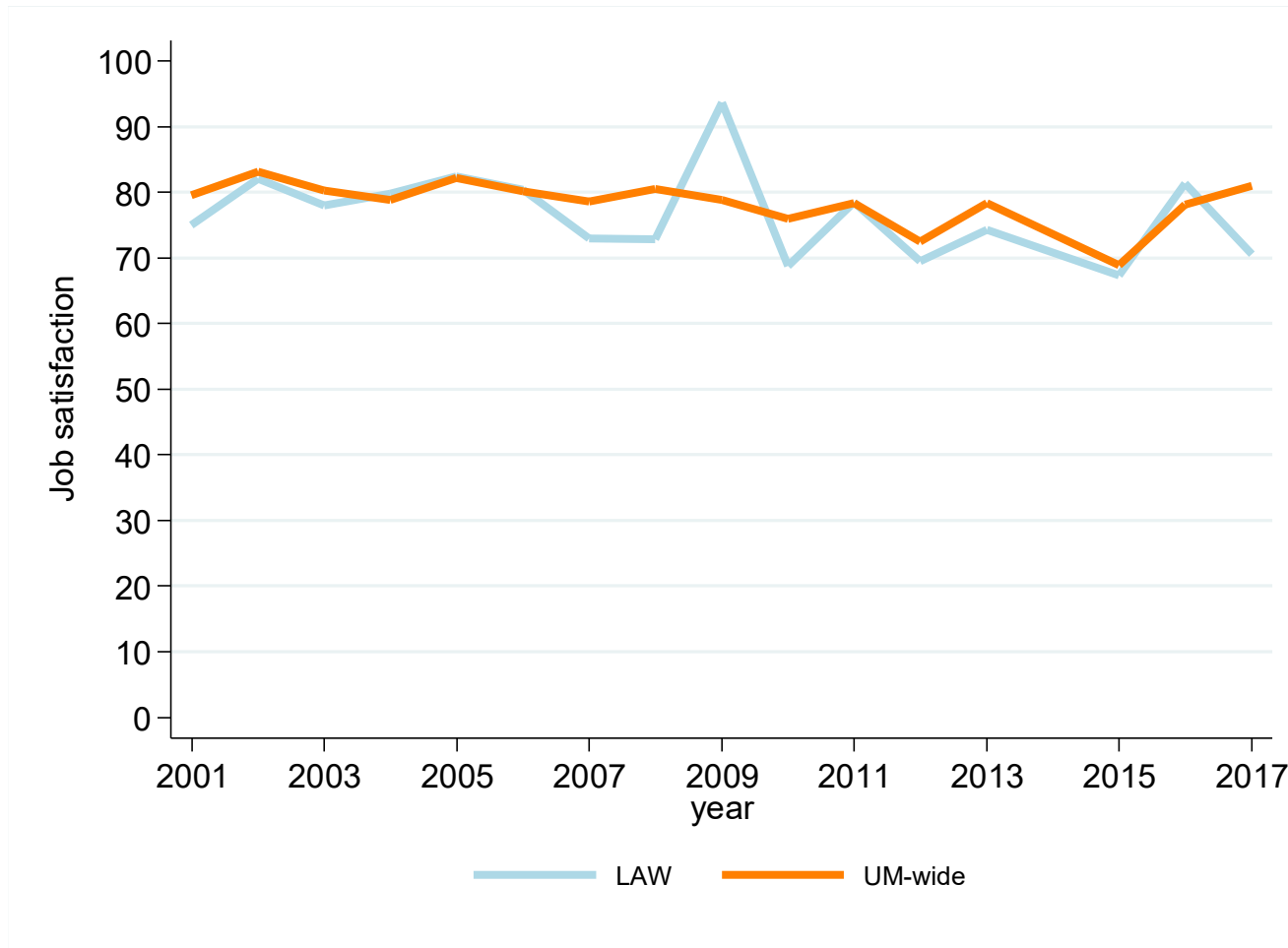


71% are (very) satisfied with their current job

Job satisfaction per master



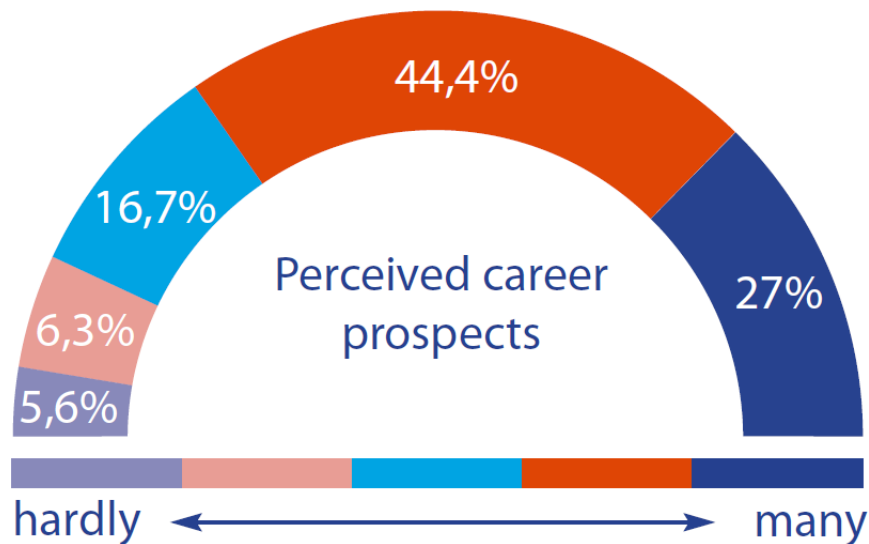

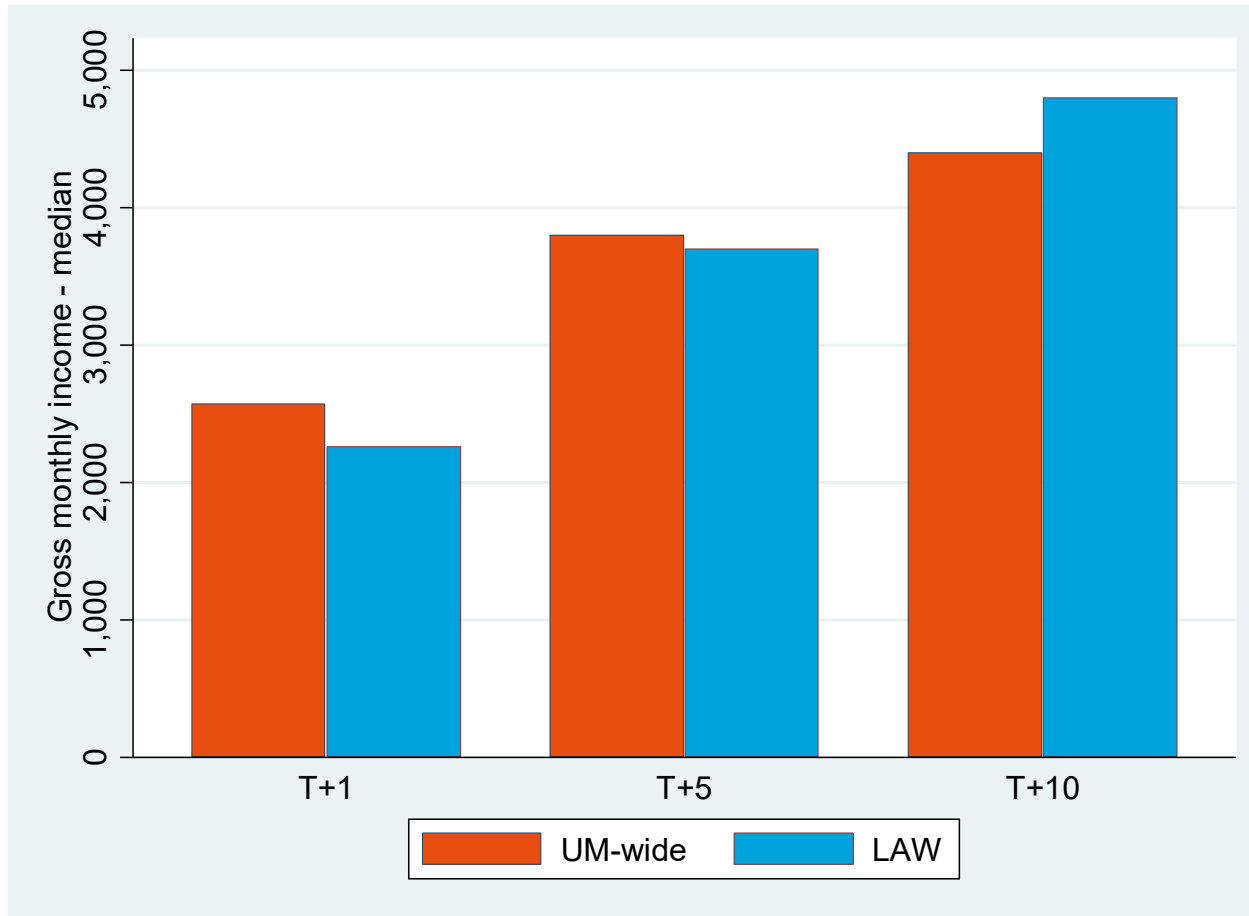

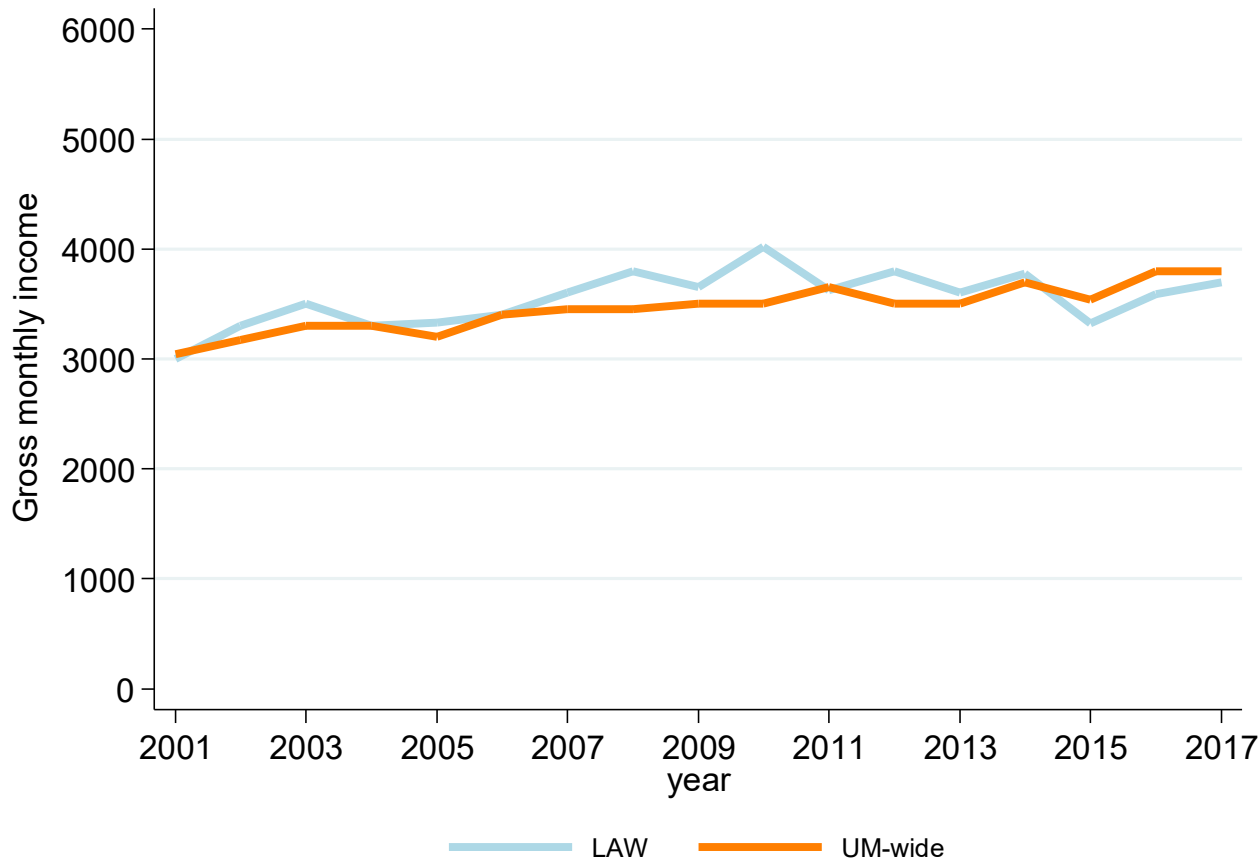
Rank 3. High salary



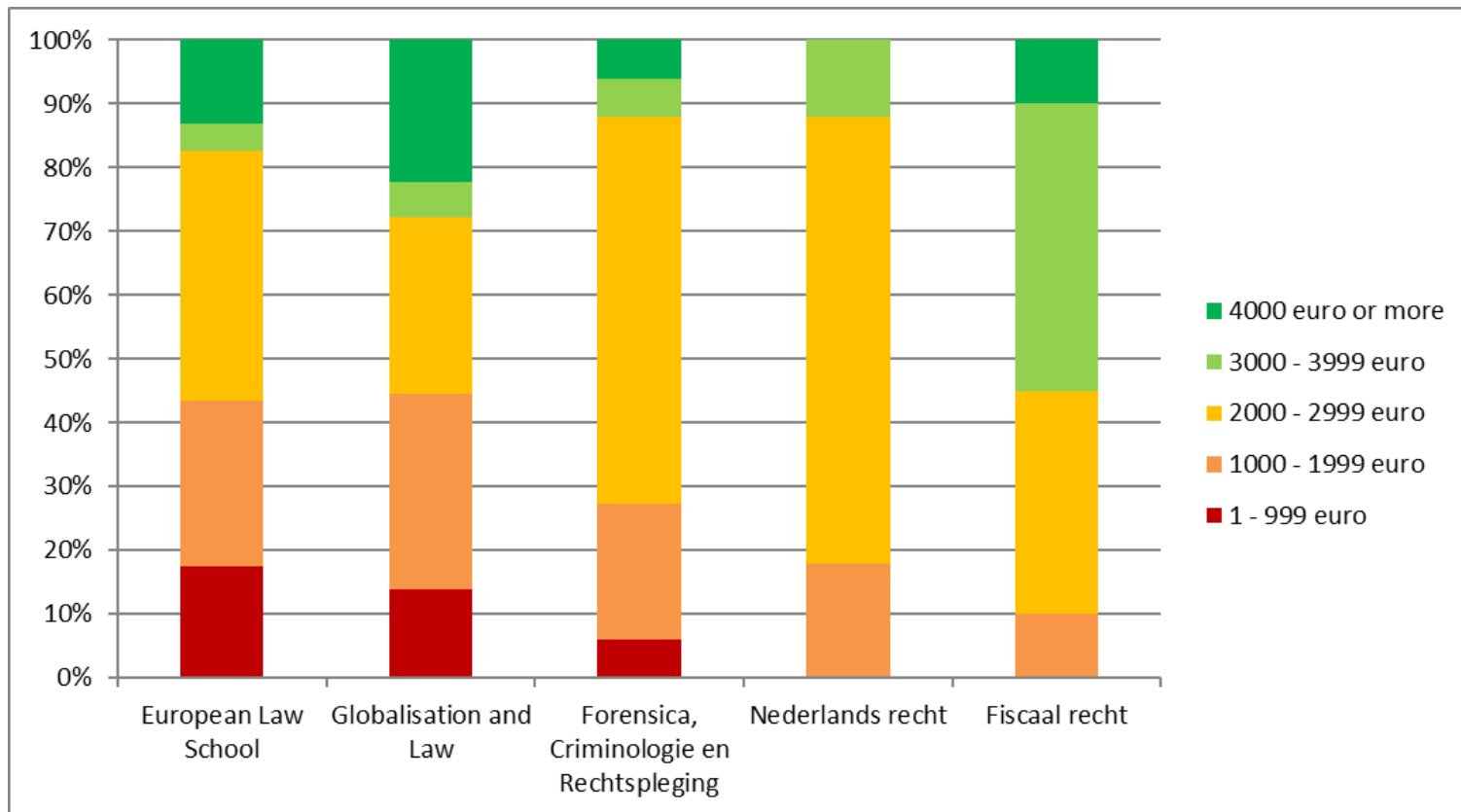
Gross monthly income

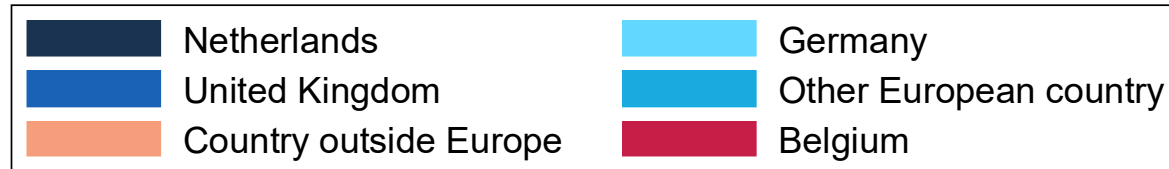
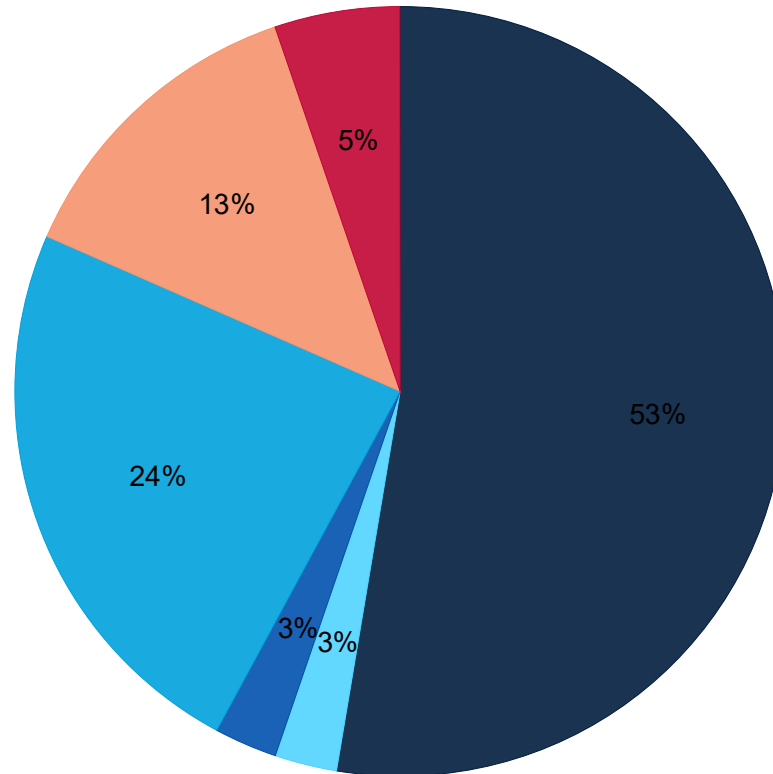
