

Core Question

What is it about?

Emphasis on:

- social forces and agency
- processes of globalization ‘from the ground up’, experienced in everyday lives.
- local actors such as migrant diasporas, small firms, families, indigenous communities, NGOs; and
- how they deal with global issues such as increasing inequalities, modern technologies, multinational firms conducting natural resource extraction, and global health issues such as HIV/AIDS.

MA GDS broadens the concept of development by focusing on old and new dynamics of inequalities, poverties and vulnerabilities in both North and South, while at the same time highlighting new processes of transformation and emancipation brought about by globalization in the 21st century.

MA GDS in brief

- One-year, selective, international and interdisciplinary MA programme,
- Taught in English,
- Multi- and inter-disciplinary skills and methods,
- An opportunity to **choose your path** the programme
 - through electives, allowing students to combine social science and humanities backgrounds with other academic disciplines,
 - through exam options, combining academic research with 'real world' experiences
- International character through staff, students, and close contacts with organizations and universities in the Global South
 - Leave **with strong critical research skills, ability to work with multicultural teams** and a **global knowledge base** that can be applied to many professional environments

Core Curriculum

Broad social science approach to *globalisation and development*:

- Theories & Histories
- Qualitative & Quantitative methods
- Globalisation and Poverty
- Core electives: reflecting internationally-recognized research at FASOS

Core Elective: Transnational Migration (GDS4003)

- Transnational families:
 - Children, parents, caregivers
 - International adoptees
 - Children on the move
- Transnational networks in transit countries
- Life-cycles of migrant families (marriage, divorce, births)

Core Elective: Science & Technology Studies (STS) for Development (GDS4004)

- Societies are shaped by science and technology; we live in “technological cultures”
- Technology can solve problems, but can also fail, or create new problems
- Crucial to development in Global North & South

Three Exam options – Semester 2
