Important deadlines for application for this study programme

Applicable when starting on 1 September 2022

When you want to apply or are applying for this study programme, it is important that you inform yourself of the deadlines that you need to meet. The important deadlines when applying for this study programme are provided in the table below.

General requirements: prior qualifications

Global Studies has a selective admissions process that is designed to assess whether there is a match between your academic interest and what Global Studies has to offer.

The admission requirements for academic year 2022/23 for the bachelor's programme in Global Studies depend on your prior qualifications. Check below which requirements apply to you.

Prospective students with a Dutch diploma

If you have one of the diplomas stated below then, in principle, you are directly admissible:

- Dutch VWO diploma
- HBO or OU propaedeutic diploma
- HBO diploma

Prospective students with a non-Dutch diploma

If you have a non-Dutch diploma that is equivalent to the Dutch VWO diploma you are, in principle, admissible to this programme. Check if this applies for your diploma.

If your diploma is not included in this list, it must be evaluated by UM first.

Prospective students who do not meet the requirements

Entrance exam, Colloquium Doctum

If you do not have the required diploma, or do not meet the additional requirements, you can still qualify by passing an entrance exam (the so called Colloquium Doctum).

If you pass the Colloquium Doctum and submit the requested proof of language proficiency, you will qualify for enrolment in the bachelor's programme.

Foundation Programme

International prospective students who do not meet the admission requirements: Foundation Programme

If you are an international prospective student, and you do not meet the admission requirements, then you may be eligible for the Foundation Programme. The Foundation Programme will provide you with intensive training in academic skills, courses relevant to your chosen bachelor's programme, and English language skills (depending on your level).

After successfully completing the Foundation Programme, you will be eligible for admission to this bachelor's programme. Additionally, the Foundation Programme offers support outside of the classroom and organises events that will help you make new friends and adjust to life in the Netherlands and at Maastricht University.

Additional requirements

Prospective students who received their prior education in a non-EU/EEA country (handling fee)

Prospective students applying for this study programme who received their prior education in a non-EU/EEA country will have to pay a handling fee. More information on this handling fee and how to arrange this payment can be found on the [Handling fee page](#).

Language requirements for English-language programmes

As English is the language of instruction in this study programme, it is essential that your English language skills are good enough for you to undertake intensive and challenging academic courses that are taught and examined in English.

Credit transfer

If you have followed university or higher vocational education before, you may qualify for exemptions. This means you can use the results you obtained elsewhere for your programme at Maastricht University.

In practice, requests for exemptions from regular courses and skills training courses are rarely approved. Only exemption from the 30 ECTS credits in the free fifth semester is possible.

A request for exemptions will only be taken into consideration after you have enrolled in the programme as a student.

Documents required for application process

During the application process for this study programme, you will need to complete a number of tasks for which you will often have to upload documents. The list below gives you an insight into what documents you will (and might) need to prepare.

Required documents for all applicants to this study programme

A recent portrait picture

This picture must satisfy certain [requirements](#).

A copy of your valid passport or your EU/EEA identity card

Make a copy of the page with your personal details. Save this copy as 'passport copy' and not as 'passport picture'.

A copy of your most recent grades transcript and a copy of your diploma if you have obtained it

- **A letter of motivation** in English of up to 600 words
This letter is used to get a better insight into your motivations and to help the Board of Admissions determine whether Global Studies is the right kind of career step for you. All applicants should write a letter answering questions such as:
 - *Why would you like to join Global Studies?*
 - *How suitable is the semester-theme approach for the way you like to study?*
 - *What are your plans after graduation?*
- **An essay**
All applicants should write a short essay in English of up to 400 words, describing a complex global problem and how it matters for them, their home community or home country locally. This essay will give the Board of Admissions a first impression of your ability to provide a well-reasoned, written argument. Please ensure that your essay addresses both parts of the question - describing the global problem and showing its local relevance! Using proper

spelling and grammar (UK or US English), as well as referencing any quotes will be helpful to your application. You are free to choose what you consider your home community or your home country for the purpose of this essay.

How do we assess your application?

When you want to apply or are applying to this study programme, it is useful to know how we assess your application. You can find more information about this here.

The Board of Admissions will review and assess your application. After your full application has been received, the Board of Admissions will inform you on their decision by mid-April the latest.

Please note that Global Studies is a selective programme.

Enrolment before completing prior education (zachte knip regulation)

To help students who have experienced delays in their studies due to COVID-19, we have put the 'zachte knip' regulation in place. This regulation means that you can enrol in your next education programme before you have completed your prior education.

Were you, due to the COVID-19 pandemic, unable to earn enough credits in the academic year 2021-22 to complete your prior education on time? In that case, you will be given the opportunity to conditionally start your next education programme at UM under certain terms in academic year 2022-23 (study start in September or February).

When are you eligible for the 'zachte knip'?

Would you like to go from:

- a bachelor's programme to a UM pre-master's or master's programme,
- a pre-master's or 'schakel' programme to a UM master's programme, or
- an HBO propedeuse (first-year diploma at a university of applied sciences) to a UM bachelor's programme?

Exceptions to the rule

As an exception to the standard, some programmes of the Faculty of Arts and Social Sciences apply an adjusted standard to admit students on the basis of the 'zachte knip':

FASoS students may miss a maximum of 12 ECTS from the last two years of their bachelor's programme. In addition, students of the UM bachelor Arts and Culture may miss a maximum of 16 ECTS as the thesis of this programme consists of 16 ECTS. Students of the UM bachelor Digital Society may miss a maximum of 17 ECTS as the thesis of this programme consists of 17 ECTS.
