

Annual CGD Activity Report

Dr. Eliza Steinbock

The Centre for Gender and Diversity (CGD) studies mechanisms of inclusion and exclusion from an intersectional perspective. Our feminist research concerns the making of cultural and social differences in cases of embodied experience, art, language, law, institutions, science and technology. We aim to use our research as a vector of change - to not only describe and explain social issues but engage stakeholders and intervene for the sake of social justice.









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1. About CGD

Description

The Centre for Gender and Diversity (CGD) is a research platform at Maastricht University's Faculty of Arts and Social Sciences. The CGD's mission is to connect researchers in the fields of gender and diversity studies, to facilitate networking with societal partners, and to enhance public-facing scholarship. Our members broadly focus on studying mechanisms of inclusion and exclusion from an intersectional perspective. The research we conduct concerns the making of cultural and social differences in cases of embodied experience, art, language, law, institutions, science and technology, and is grounded in feminist and intersectional approaches to critical analysis. We aim to use our research as a vector of change - to not only describe and explain social issues but to engage stakeholders and intervene for the sake of social justice.

History and Ambition

Founded in September 1998, the CGD has a 25-year tradition of creating synergy between the Three As: Academia, Art, and Activism. Our research projects are interdisciplinary, embedded, and conduct knowledge creation with the participation of partners. CGD scholarship charts the symbolic systems of the arts, cultural production, and language use. It maps and transforms the interactions of schemata for masculinity and femininity with social difference categories of race, class, age, ability, sexuality, religion, residency status, as well as multitude emerging factors that influence personhood/subject positions.

The overarching CGD intellectual mission is the historical and contemporary study of the complex interactions between these intersecting vectors of power differentials, in the tradition of feminist theories and methods of intersectionality. In our research on a wide variety of minoritised subjects we do not lose sight of how intersectional approaches have been developed primarily by Black and of color feminists to account for multiple forms of oppression. In an interdisciplinary fashion, we seek to contribute to the development of intersectionality by combining empirical and sociological data and philosophies of embodiment with a humanities approach to the study of the arts: including literature, life-writing, performance, visual culture, digital culture, heritage, and cultural institutions.

Our theoretical ambition is to reassess the humanism at the core of intersectionality. We do so through the key question we ask of these art forms interfacing with society: what composes the Human? Here, there, now, and then? This brings our scholarship to debates in science (technicity), ethics of medicine and care (personhood), to the exigencies of enslavement (coloniality), and to the realm of nature (animality). Hence, we also contribute to Critical Life Studies that grapples with the multiple 'turns' (e.g. new materialism, Anthropocene, affective) and multiplying field 'studies' (trans, queer, critical race, postcolonial, animal, age, disability) in critical theory that interrogate the ontological hold of the Human in the face of global crises of climate and social justice.

2. Organization

The CGD is exclusively funded by the Faculty Board of FASoS, and reports to them annually. Given this organizational structure, the CGD's affiliate members that are supported by its funds are FASoS scientific personnel. Affiliate members also include PhD candidates registered at the Graduate School and UCM staff members. Since 1 September 2022, the CGD has welcomed as participating members Teaching Fellows who are developing a PhD proposal or otherwise engaged in research. (Funding is available to support research activities to any staff member at UM so long as they partner up with one or more CGD members.) See an overview of our current members in Appendix A. Members actively collaborate with colleagues from across the university, with regional institutions and organizations such as the Jan van Eyck, national partners including the Research School for Gender Studies and Netherlands Institute for Cultural Analysis, and we form international alliances with other university-based centres and networks.

The director is Prof. dr. Eliza Steinbock, who oversees the daily management of the budget, event organization, networking for the centre, internal and external communications. The student assistant takes care of communications and event organization, including social media posting, designing and hanging posters, arrangements for speakers, catering, and supporting the director's work. The CGD also receives assistance with their webpage needs from Claire Bollen, their UM and FASoS news/reports from Eva Durlinger, their hotel and event arrangements from the L&K secretariat, and with their budget from Iris Hutschemakers. We are thankful for all the efforts they also made in the past year on behalf of the CGD.

3. Overview and Reflection on the year Mar 2023 - Feb 2024

Changes

This has been a major year of reconnection with the CGD's 25-year legacy and working towards a revitalization that can sustain the centre for the next 25 years. To set the tone of this year, in our announcement of our jubilee symposium I invoked the inclusive declaration, "Feminism is for Everybody," stated by scholar-activist bell hooks to describe feminists' passionate and personal politics. As our affiliate member numbers have stabilized around 40 over the last year, it has been an important motto to foster cohesion within our cultivated big tent feeling of belonging.

With positive feedback to the following ideas I proposed, this year I implemented three new lines of funding and activities for our members, with an eye to support members at all stages of development and dissemination of research:

<u>Dissertation Workshops</u> – Specifically for PhD Candidates who are members of the CGD and in the final year of their project. They can invite a scholar to come to Maastricht for a small-scale meeting to engage with their manuscript, in the company of other CGD members and their supervisory team. The workshop catering, speaker fee, travel and accommodation costs will be covered.

- Two PhD candidates approaching their final year have been invited to start the process of planning the workshops, which will take place in the 2024-2025 academic year.

<u>Vectors for Change Lecture Series</u> – CGD members can invite speakers from near and far to share their unique analyses of intersecting vectors of power differentials. The series aims to showcase how research can become a vector of change - to not only describe and explain social issues, but to involve public partners and intervene for the sake of social justice. The lecture can be a CGD only event, or in collaboration with a FASoS research programme, another FASoS centre, or a local partner. The presentations are of engaged research in the tradition of feminist theories and methods of intersectionality. The catering, speaker fee, travel and accommodation costs will be covered.

- We have organized four of these lectures, with two planned lectures having to be canceled due to illness.

Open Access Book Fund – The CGD supports up to € 3000 towards the publication of book projects in which a CGD member has a leading role as (co)author or (co)editor that are demonstrably open access, open science, or public humanities projects, in line with our Recognition and Reward's Core Academic Values. With the CGD-Publication Fund, the CGD thereby helps achieve its own aim "to not only describe and explain social issues but to engage stakeholders and intervene for the sake of social justice." This funding brings the CGD into alignment with the publication streams of other research centres, many of which have their own book series. However, we distinctly wish to fill the gap of funding for open access books that Vice-dean of Research Prof. dr. Wyatt has noted is

problematically neglected by UM, NWO, and other funding sources at this point in time. To be awarded, the application would stipulate that the publication:

- 1) is a demonstrable contribution to Open Science, Open Access or Public Humanities
- 2) is clearly furthering the mission of the CGD
- 3) has a publisher who is willing to offer or has given a contract
- 4) costs are directly related to distribution or to production e.g. for design, publishing, translation, editing, indexing
- 5) costs requested are a maximum of 3k (amount could be matched with SWOL funds)
- 6) includes a clear time path for publication

With our first two books being published in the Flemish and Dutch languages, we are also seeking to achieve greater outreach to these language audiences. The Faculty Board has generously covered 5000- towards the costs of one OA book this past year, Sophie Withaeckx's co-edited volume *Voorbij Transnationale Adoptie*, with an additional amount being spent from the CGD operating budget. The long-awaited CGD volume of interviews on the topic of intergenerational feminisms has received a contract from Mazirel Press (in March 2024) and is slated to come out in early 2025. This book's publishing costs up to 5000- will also be covered by funding from the Faculty Board. Therefore, this fund will open up for another book project in the next budgetary cycle in 2025.

Achievements

We are staying the course to align with the Faculty's strategic plan to foster collaborative research and our adoption of the national Recognition and Rewards's core academic values. As such, the CGD continued to, and will continue to, prioritize its efforts in initiating and facilitating collaboration through research and action networks, and together with societal partners. We set our sights on the goal to increase the output of funding applications, their success rates, and to foster generative collaborations.

In terms of funding applications, we secured one PhD candidate from NWO's PhD in the Humanities scheme and prepared another application that reached the interview stage (outcome pending). We have taken part in multiple European level bids as an international partner, with two being successful, one of which brought a postdoc into the centre.

I aimed this year to double the number of research and valorization events from three to six, so as to intensify our visibility and strengthen relationships with academic and societal partners. As you can read below in our inventory of milestones, we more than met this goal with 8 research events (public-facing, for FASoS, UM audiences) and 6 member-based meetings. Although we do not have students as our primary audience, where possible we have opened up our events to ResMA, MA and BA students, advertised on the FASoS screens and put up posters around the faculty and other UM buildings to invite a wide community to attend. Notably, the most attended events were on the topics of queer intersectional feminism, decolonization, boycotting as a solidarity strategy, and social justice trends in digital marketing.

Leading up to our 25-year anniversary symposium in the Fall, we had a high level of participation from members: they were organizing speakers for six panels, a group zine-making workshop, a short film screening, and volunteering to help out during the event. Over two days, we revisited the CGD's remarkable journey, honoring 25 years of intersectional scholarship at UM. The full day program featured a discussion among past and present directors, a creative keynote by Prof. Iris van der Tuin, and engaging roundtables with scholars, activists, and artists exploring intersectional legacies, counter-archiving, tech's feminist power, academic leadership, pedagogy, and publication cultures. This symposium wasn't just a reflection—it was a call to action. It urged us to refocus on pressing issues fallen off the broader feminist agenda, demanding our immediate attention. On our website we have a summary of events, a gallery of featured photographs from the day (taken by Eric Bleize), and a downloadable version of the collective zine. Around 100 people visited and participated in the symposium, many of which are in the group photograph which hangs now in the Grote Gracht 90-92 second floor foyer with our book harvest and article tree. A framed copy of the photograph was also gifted to the three former directors as a thank you for their service and a memento of the celebration.

I employed Farbod Nael's special skills for design and social media communication to create a new banner for our webpage and for a stand up banner that is on display in our CGD foyer. He also created a special design and logo for the Vectors for Change lecture series (a poster, stand-up banner, web announcement) and a designed logo for the POP sessions. Farbod is continuing the work of updating and refreshing our online presence as we build out a professional infrastructure for the CGD. He also consulted on and assisted my development of the new interactive promotional video of the CGD that will be our calling card for the next 5-8 years. This video is being made by the local media company CONCREET. and is a part of the central level marketing and communications team's pilot project to generate more interest in and knowledge about UM institutes.

Our first Soteria follow Maria Vtorushina organized this half-day symposium with contributions from Maria Vtorushina (historical and contemporary overview), Anton Shebetko (artist talk), Svitlana Shymko (lecture and screening of 'The Wonderful Years' (2018), and screening of 'I Am Michelle' (2020) by Olena Siyatovska about a young transgender woman from a Ukrainian village who is

pursuing an international modeling career. It was attended by 27 people from the CGD, the Jan van Eyck Academy, and the broader UM community.

13 June Diversity and Inclusivity Office PRIDE Month event

"Queer Intersectional Feminism: Why and How?" Presentation of six lightning talks from Christin Höne, Louis van den Hengel, Eliza Steinbock, Ilaria Lorusso, and Vasso Belia to showcase our research in the field of Queer Studies and to advertise for the coming Pride month Queer conference in July 2024. Attended by 60 people, mainly students from across UM.

Fall 2023

6 September Welcome Back CGD Meeting

- Discussion of the coming academic year's CGD program, announcing the new funding streams, and final planning for the jubilee year events.

6 September Vectors for Change lecture # 1

"Africa's Second Struggle for Freedom: What's decolonization got to do with it?" Olúfémi Táíwò (Cornell University)

- Elsje Fourie took the lead to co-organize the event with the research programme Globalisation, Development, and Transnationalism. It was attended by 220 people including a large cohort of students and staff from across UM, many related to the Global Studies programs. Dhika Sajad gave a response.

21-22 September Intergenerational Feminisms Symposium

Two-day program including a welcome reception with intersectional and intergenerational short films, video message from UM President Rianne Letschert, welcome speech from Dean Christine Neuhold, keynote from Iris van der Tuin, short interviews conducted by Aagje Swinnen with Sally Wyatt and Roel van der Oever on generational knowledge, and six roundtables featuring primarily Netherlands, Belgium, and UK-based scholars, artists, and activists. Attended by around 100 people.

Winter 2024

29 January Open Access & Engaged Humanities Book Launch

Sophie Withaeckx, together with Chiara Candaele (University of Antwerp/Algemeen Rijksarchief België) and Atamhi Cawayu (Ghent University), co-edited the book, *Voorbij Transnationale Adoptie*, with 36 authors. This book combines historical, anthropological, sociological and ethical perspectives on transnational adoption with essays and reflections written by adoptees themselves. It was launched with a film screening of the documentary 'Une histoire à soi' (dir. Amandine Gay 2021), followed by a panel discussion at Cinema Lumière. A Critical Adoption Studies research seminar was also held over two days. Attended by 75 people.

7 February *CGD Writing Retreat*

At the Social Hub, we had a day-long retreat to work on research applications, articles, and dissertations. It was attended by 18 members, who could enjoy lunch and all day catering as well as the communal spaces of the Social Hub.

6 March 2024 Vectors for Change lecture # 4

"Big Brands Are Watching You: Marketing Social Justice and Digital Culture" Francesca Sobande (Cardiff University)

- Sophie Withaeckx co-organised with research programme Arts, Media, and Culture "Inclusive Societies" strand and also arranged for Sobande to give a PhD masterclass for five CGD candidates. Attended by 50 people.

19 February – 22 March Visiting PhD Fellow

Tais Terletskaja was a visiting PhD from the Department of Arts and Cultural Studies at the University of Copenhagen. At the CGD, they worked together with the temporary supervisors Eliza Steinbock and Sandro Weilenmann. Tais organized a small symposium of three speakers in the afternoon of March 20, 2024, who were students from the NOG/NICA course *Trans* Archives, Arts, Affects taught by Steinbock (Feb-Mar).

Interfaculty collaboration

As Director of the CGD, Eliza Steinbock is on the advisory council for the Diversity and Inclusivity Office, which is composed of staff from the different faculties and student services and a student representative. We meet around 5-6 times a year to discuss and advise on D&I actions, issues, and in this past year also the assessment of the D&I office and its future structure.

This past year Christin Hoene has been organizing the QueerCon Conference and Festival, funded through the D&I grants and the CGD, with additional local partnerships. QueerCon is the first of its kind in UM history, and will take place over 1-2 July 2024. It promises to be a vital platform for LGBTQIA+ scholarship, activism and community building at UM and beyond. Working with Prof Kai Jonas from FPN and colleagues from FASoS (Shirin Ardalan, Harro van Lente, and Farbod Nael as student assistant), they announced the call for participation and have drawn up a program that includes presentations from all UM faculties by both students and staff.

Following a successful application to the FASoS RSF with CGD co-sponsorship, Aagje Swinnen has initiated her project on an "Anti-ageism Intervention." Swinnen is working in collaboration with CGD colleagues Ilya Malafei (UCM), Sara de Vuyst (FASoS), and student assistants Emma Hizette and Greta Carlevaro. It involves 29 project ambassadors located within all UM faculties.

National collaboration

We participate in the board and the curriculum committee of the Netherlands Research School for Gender Studies (NOG), which met 3 times this year. Eliza Steinbock is on the board, and Faisal Hamadah is on the curriculum committee. Noah Littel and Vasso Belia have completed their terms as the CGD/UM PhD council representatives. Pieter du Plessis has been proposed as the CGD/UM PhD council representative for NOG. Eliza Steinbock is also on the board of the Netherlands Institute for Cultural Analysis, which met twice this past year.

In the last week of August 2023, Steinbock was a lecturer at the NOG summer school, officially called the Network of Interdisciplinary Gender Studies in Europe (NOISE) Summer School. The theme of "Queer, Trans, Sexual Archives" attracted the max. 100 attendees of RMA and PhD candidates. Steinbock gave the lecture "T4T: Archival Legacies of Trans for Trans Adoration" and took part in a five person roundtable on "Diving In: Practices of Queer and Trans Archiving."

For 5 weeks over February - March 2024, Steinbock gave the 5 ect Course *Trans* Archives, Art, Affects for 15 registered RMA and PhD candidates, which was cross-listed as a Core Course for the Netherlands Institute for Cultural Analysis (NICA) and Netherlands Research School for Gender Studies (NOG). For next year, we have already arranged that Faisal Hamadah and Timo Makari will give a 5 ect course for NICA titled, Temporalities of Liberation: History and the Question of Freedom.


