



Gaining the CeQuInt stamp of approval

Maastricht University has successfully completed the Certificate for Quality in Internationalisation (CeQuInt) audit, awarded by the European Consortium for Accreditation.

UM is the only Dutch university holding the prestigious European accreditation at the institutional level.

CeQuInt recognises universities for excellence in integrating international and intercultural dimensions into their education and institutional strategy.

An independent external panel praised Maastricht University's broad support for Problem-Based Learning, interdisciplinary collaboration, and its deeply embedded quality culture.

Maastricht University was rated positively on all five CeQuInt standards, scoring 'excellent' in Intended internationalisation and Enhancement.

The accreditation remains valid for five years. Recommendations from the audit will be developed into an action plan together with internal and external stakeholders.

Dutch universities sound the alarm in Brussels: invest in education and research

As the European Commission prepares the next Multi-annual Financial Framework (2028–2034), the Association of Universities of the Netherlands (UNL) is calling for strong, sustained investment in research and innovation (R&I).

In a letter to Commission President Ursula von der Leyen, UNL warns that without a dedicated tenth Framework Programme (FP10), Europe risks falling behind global competitors.

UNL urges the Commission to:

- Establish a standalone FP10 with a €220 billion budget
- Ensure all Member States invest at least 3% of GDP in R&I
- Support academic freedom, collaboration, and both fundamental and applied research
- Simplify administrative processes for researchers

The letter also underlines the Dutch universities' commitment to European collaboration and to shaping a strong future for EU research and education.

Ongoing protest against government education policies

Maastricht University has joined other Dutch institutions in staggered strike action against planned cuts in government funding for higher education and research.

At the same time, Maastricht University is lobbying to maintain its special position as an international university and a driver for social and economic development in the Limburg region.

The university is one of the signatories of an urgent letter to the Education Minister and parliament, in which coalition of local governments, businesses, and educational institutions call for sustained education funding, legislative support for international talent and improved public transport infrastructure. The letter warns of severe economic import from a potential decline in international student numbers.

Expand your skills in responsible robotics

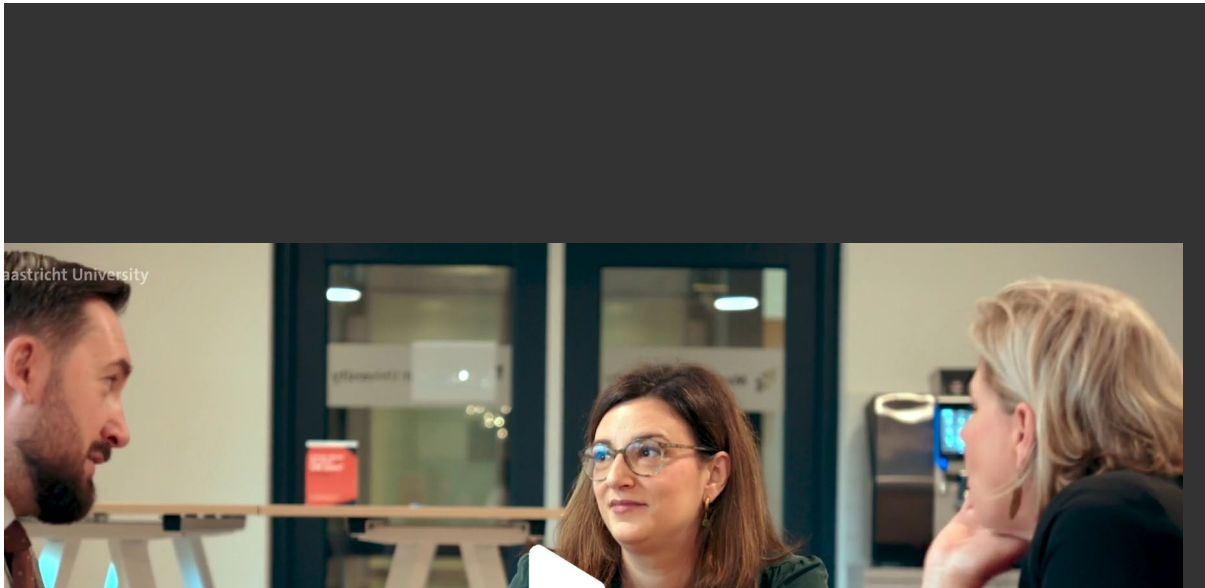
The University of York and Maastricht University are teaming up to host a Robotics Doctoral Summer School from 18–22 August 2025 in York, UK.
